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Knowledge:

- I can name and locate some of the main Islands, including the Isle of Wight, Guernsey, Jersey, the Isle of Man, the Hebrides, the Orkneys and the Shetland Isles

- Great Britain consists of England, Scotland and Wales.

- Brighton used to be a fishing village, but King George turned it into a holiday resort in the 1780s.
- Features of Brighton include the Royal Pavilion, the i360, Brighton Beach, the piers and the South Downs.



In this topic, children learn about the make-up of the British Isles. They also learn traditional stories from different parts of the U.K., related to dragons. Children are expected to focus on an aspect of history from a local city, in this case, Brighton. They study the history of the Royal Pavilion and its colourful owner, George IV.
